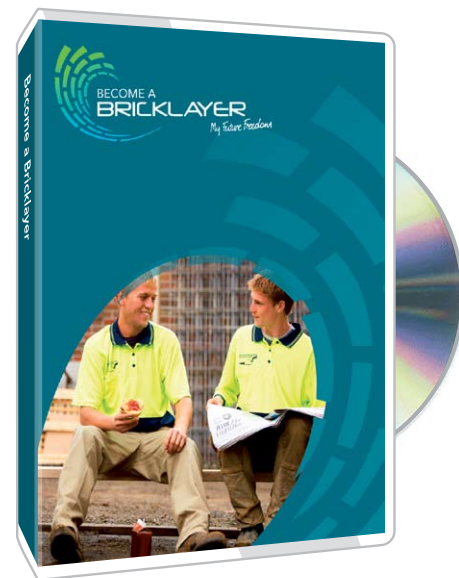

Through the course, FCTA met with some outstanding bricklaying craftsmen.

Paolo was an Italian immigrant who came to Australia in 1972 to work as a bricklayer. It was Paolo's wish that his son Steve follow in his footsteps, so he patiently worked with Steve over many years to give him the skills that led him to becoming a dedicated and skilful bricklayer.

Steve has gone on over the years to train five apprentices, although fully skilled, he had not had the opportunity

to gain a qualification. After going through the FCTA RPL process he now has that qualification. Steve accredited all his work skills and work ethic to his father Paolo. It was his wish that Steve have his skills recognised and FCTA have delivered on this. Paolo's efforts over the years has now contributed to more than 10 people being gainfully employed.

Apprentices to Receive \$5,500 Tax Free Bonus to Stay in Trade

ABBTF has welcomed the Federal Government's Trade Apprentice Income Bonus which encourages apprentices to stay in their trade. The bonus, which incorporates the Tools for your Trade payment, where apprentices will receive tax-free payments as they reach milestones in their apprenticeship starting with a payment of \$800 after three months with a total of \$5,500 payable up to completion.

ABBTF's general manager, Geoff Noble, says a number of apprentices leave their trade before completion, exacerbating the skills shortage in the construction industry.

"We have had considerable success increasing the numbers of bricklaying apprentices coming into the trade through our generous subsidy for employers. Now the Federal Government's Bonus will directly encourage apprentices, through the milestone payments, to complete their training and gain their qualification", said Geoff Noble.
