We Built a School!



Bricklaying apprentices on the Roseneath Primary School project, at Austins Ferry are very proud of the school they helped to build.

The apprentices were Adam Lane (2nd Year), Daniel Wooley (1st Year), William Casey (2nd Year) and Cameron Parker (4th Year), all employed by Channel Bricklaying.

Andrew Clark of Channel Bricklaying said this was a great project to teach his apprentices a range of bricklaying skills.

The job was all face brickwork and included squint corners, sills and header courses. More than 500 hours of training



was provided for the four apprentices during the construction stage from June to November 2010.

Skills Tasmania assessed the apprentices on the job where competencies were achieved and less off-the job training was needed.

All four apprentices are supported by ABBTF with the Brickstart subsidy of \$2,000 per annum for each apprentice.

A face brick job of this standard, involving a team of tradesmen with apprentices, is an ideal learning environment. Adam Lane (pictured) spent the most time on the project and is keen to tell his mates and family "I built that".

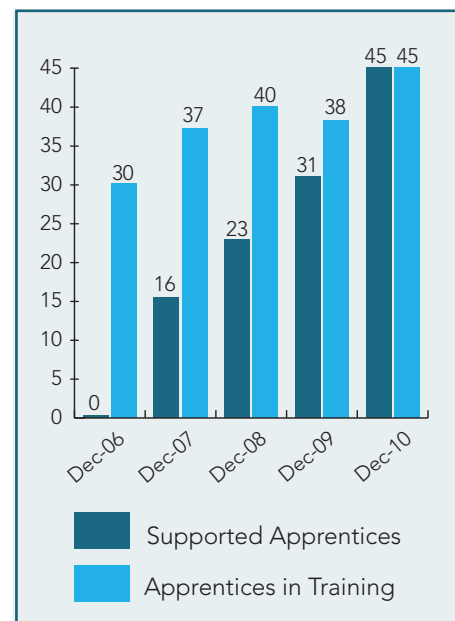
The project included seven separate buildings and used 47,000 Old Launceston face bricks and 8,000 blocks from K&D Bricks & Pavers. Principal Contractors – Hazell Bros.

ABBTf Programs Boost Apprentice Numbers

Apprentice numbers in Tasmania have increased in response to the ABBTF strategy to build a skilled work force. ABBTF Step Out Programs in schools have provided some excellent young apprentices and the \$6,000 subsidy has supported bricklayers with their employment and training of new apprentices.

There are 45 apprentices enrolled in training which is the highest ever.

We are pleased to see this sustained growth which gives us confidence that the next generation of trained bricklayers will be capable of satisfying future industry demand.

The Tasmanian Building & Construction Industry Training Board (TBCITB) is again offering an \$8,000 support payment to employers who sign an apprentice between 1 May and 30 November 2011. This payment is on top of ABBTF's subsidy of \$6,000 and the Federal Government's \$4,000 adding to a **total of \$18,000** to employers of new bricklaying apprentices.

The TBCITB support is paid by two instalments:

1. \$2,000 after 12 months employment and completion of one Level III competency on the job.
2. \$6,000 on successful completion of the training including at least four Level III competencies on the job.

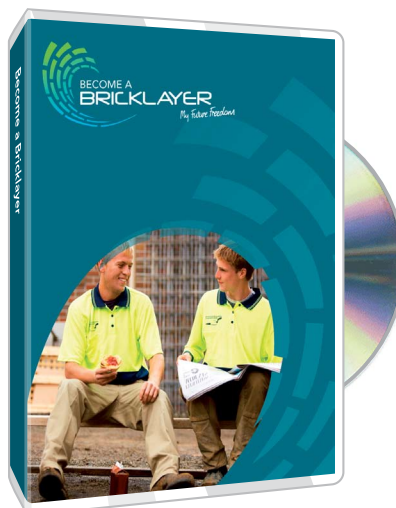

Apprentices to Receive \$5,500 Tax Free Bonus to Stay in Trade

ABBTF has welcomed the Federal Government's Trade Apprentice Income Bonus which will encourage apprentices to stay in their trade. The Trade Apprentice Income Bonus, which incorporates the Tools for your Trade payment, will mean apprentices will receive tax-free payments as they reach milestones in their apprenticeship starting with a payment of \$800 after three months with a total of \$5,500 payable up to completion.

ABBTF's general manager, Geoff Noble, says a number of apprentices leave their trade before completion, exacerbating the skills shortage in the industry.

"We have had considerable success increasing the numbers of bricklaying apprentices coming into the trade through our generous subsidy for employers. Now the Federal Government's Bonus will directly encourage apprentices, through the milestone payments, to go right through and obtain their qualification", said Geoff Noble.

TBCITB Committed to Apprentice Training

The TBCITB in their State of the Industry Report confirmed their support for the current apprentice training model for the building and construction industry.

The Board also confirmed it does not support the institutional delivery of apprenticeship qualifications with no employment relationship.

The report also included many issues raised at regional workshops across the state, attended by some 150 industry practitioners.
